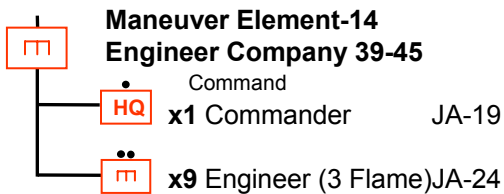
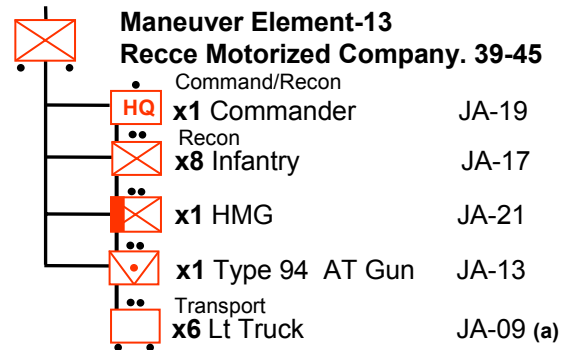
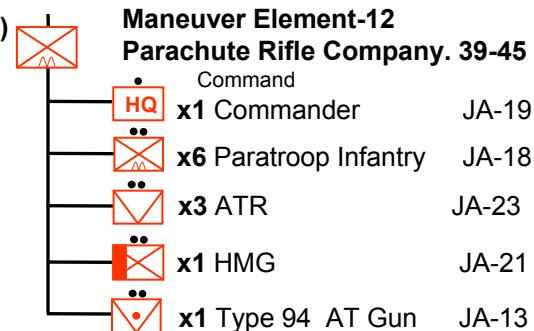
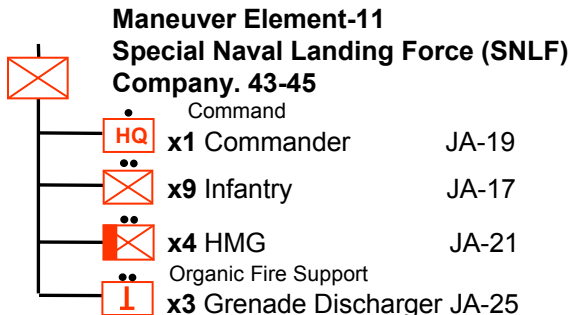
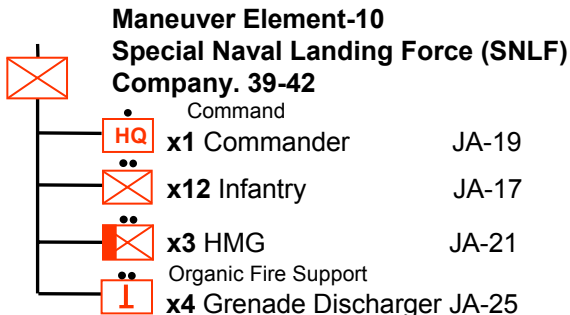
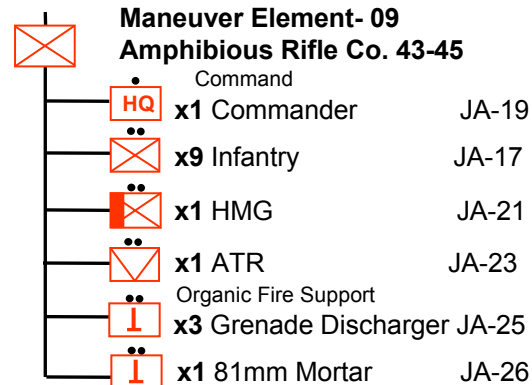
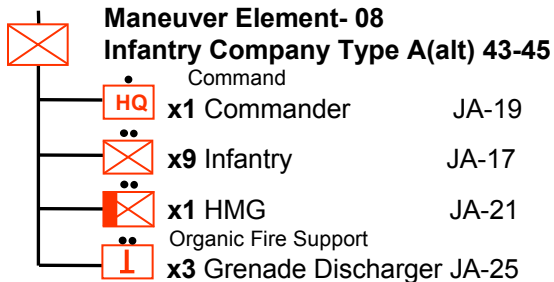
Japanese Armor

Japanese Armor is organized so that one stand represents approximately 1 stand=3 actual vehicles. This does not always divide precisely into the platoon organization. Where a discrepancy exists, the 1:3 ratio took precedence.
